

#### Budget Resolutions vs. Appropriations

#### **Budget Resolution**

- One resolution passed by House and Senate
- Sets top level spending number for next fiscal year
- Does not go to the President and is not a law
- Guides Appropriators

#### **Appropriations**


- 12 bills that set individual spending levels for individual agencies
- Includes specific instructions to agencies, called "directives"
- When combined, called an "omnibus bill"
- Continued funding after failure to meet October 1 deadline called a "continuing resolution"

# The Budget Process – How It Worked in 2022 (Funding FY2023)

Member appropriations requests due

March 30

Congress passes three Continuing Resolutions from September 30 – December 30, 2022

September 30 – December 30, 2022

#### **June 2022**

Drafting of appropriations bills began in June

#### **December 29, 2022**

President Biden signs the *Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023* on December 29, 2022

- \$1.7 trillion omnibus bill
- \$44.9 billion in aid for Ukraine
- \$40.6 billion for natural disasters

# Other Issues Related to the Funding the Government



**Continuing resolution (CR):** A resolution by Congress to provide temporary funding for Federal agencies and programs until appropriations bills are signed in a new fiscal year



**Shut down:** When federal agencies must discontinue all non-essential functions until new funding legislation (appropriations bill, continuing resolution) is passed and signed into law



**Debt ceiling:** The debt ceiling is the legal cap that Congress sets on the amount that the Treasury can borrow



# Step 4: Select the right bill (Appropriations Subcommittee)

- You will arrive at a page that lists all 12 Subcommittees
- Click on the bill for the Subcommittee that covers your program
- Example: Finding program money at CISA → Homeland Security bill

# Step 5: Now that you have found where your agency is - you can find your program

- Return to the page "FY2023 Bills" and select the bill you are looking for
- Example: We are looking for funding for the State Homeland Security Grant Program at the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) at DHS
- Click on BILL→

**Step 6: Click on the bill text** 





#### **Step 6: Use Control + F (find) to search through the bill text**

- Pro tip: Open in viewer/ PDF or download it easier to access results
- Ctrl + F "State Homeland Security Grant Program"

(1) \$520,000,000 for the State Homeland Security Grant Program under section 2004 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 605), of which \$90,000,000 shall be for Operation Stonegarden, \$15,000,000 shall be for Tribal Home-

#### One Hundred Seventeenth Congress of the United States of America

AT THE SECOND SESSION

Begun and held at the City of Washington on Monday, the third day of January, two thousand and twenty-two

#### An Act

Making consolidated appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, and for providing emergency assistance for the situation in Ukraine, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023".





#### What are directives?

- Directives are like instructions found in bill reports (\*called explanatory reports) that accompany the appropriations bill
- Appropriations Committees use directives to include their recommendations to agencies for appropriated money
- Committee recommendations can include restrictions, expectations, reporting requirements, deadlines, etc. and our favorite: "None of these funds."



#### Step 1: Access the bill report

- Go back to "FY2023 Bills"
- Click on "report" for the bill you want to search through
- Like before open the report in viewer/
   PDF or download for easier access





#### **Step 2: Searching for your directive**

- Example: You are an IT company who has done past work in cybersecurity infrastructure – you want to know if there are any new program changes coming
- Control + F (find) "Cybersecurity..."

# Step 3: Understanding the fine print

- Begin clicking through the results from your search
- Example: This directive encourages CISA to develop standardized requirements for third-party cybersecurity service providers

Accreditation of Third-Party Cybersecurity Service Providers.—
The Committee recognizes that, while a robust market of private sector cybersecurity providers is necessary to meet demand from vulnerable entities and protect national critical functions from cybersecurity threats, critical infrastructure organizations may lack the expertise and/or the information necessary to identify and select highly qualified providers. The Committee encourages CISA to continue efforts to develop standardized requirements for and accredit third-party cybersecurity service providers and make available the list of such providers to federal agencies, SLTT governments, and critical infrastructure organizations. The recommendation includes \$5,000,000 above the request to expand this effort to include vulnerability assessment and incident response providers.



#### Why are directives important?

- Directives are indicators of issues of importance to Congress and the White House
- They are also indicators of where agencies might target money or priorities for the coming fiscal year
- Example: President's 2021 E.O. on Cybersecurity
  - The trickle-down effect: Cybersecurity initiatives included in the E.O. began to pop up in agency action and in directives put forth by Congress
  - You can use directives to identify agency goals, upcoming projects, grants, RFP responses, capability briefings, and more

# Elevate Your Company

- Weigh in on procurement policies that affect small businesses
- Get to know agency officials through participation on panels and forums for your industry
- Ask a good question which introduces your company
  - "Ann Sullivan with Madison Services Group. We provide government relations services to the small business sector...my question is: xxx"
- Become conversant in the political realm because agency priorities follow Congressional and White House priorities
